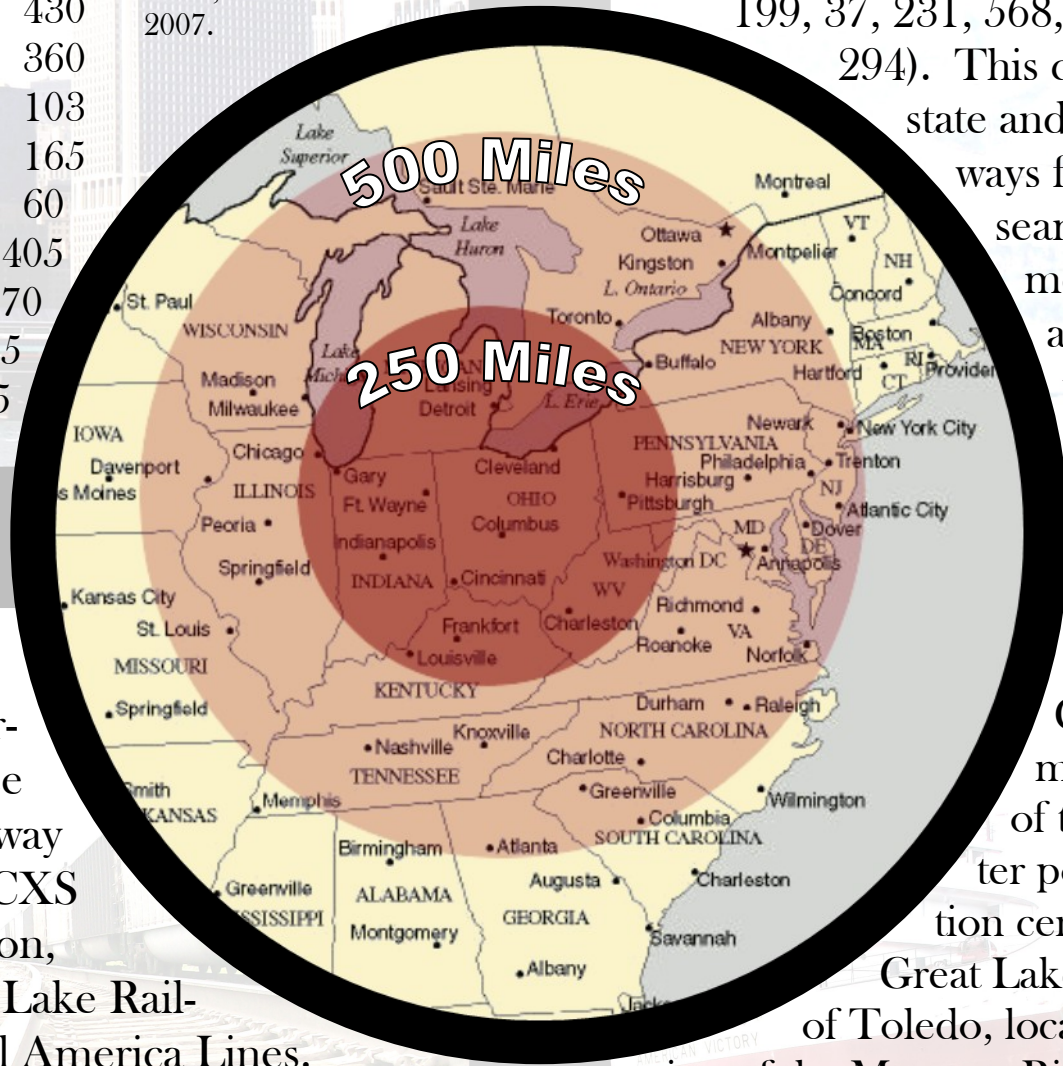

Wyandot County is at the intersection of four lane U.S. Route 30 and U.S. Route 23. In addition, we are home to nine State Routes (53, 67, 199, 37, 231, 568, 103, 182, 294). This combination of state and federal highways facilitates the seamless movement of people and products throughout the region.



Wyandot County is serviced by three different railway companies, CXS Transportation, Wheeling & Lake Railway, and Rail America Lines. In total, there are five airports in the region including Wyandot County's local airport, Findlay Airport (22 miles), Mansfield-Lahm Airport (40 miles), Toledo Express Airport (60 miles), and Columbus International Airport (70 miles).


Wyandot County is 60 miles from one of the busiest water port transportation centers on the Great Lakes. The Port of Toledo, located at the union of the Maumee River and the western basin of Lake Erie, allows business professionals to expand and accelerate their supply chain. Adequate access to the Port of Toledo links Wyandot County to a multitude of domestic and international markets via the marine transportation system.

Wyandot County is centrally located between the states four largest markets capitalizing on the Ohio's top-of-the-line logistics infrastructure which offers seamless movement of products, people, information, and services. When considering transportation and logistics, Wyandot County just makes sense!

Ohio is:

- Home to 6 international airports and 3 air cargo hubs.
- A 180-public airport system serving all of Ohio's 88 counties.
- Accesses 8 interstate highways and 20 major federal and state routes.
- Ohio has the 7th largest highway system and the 4th largest interstate system.
- Ohio's trucking industry ranks 4th among the fifty states based on total economic output of \$5.2 billion.
- A rail system of 36 freight railroads.
- Ohio also ranks 4th in rail transportation—a \$1.3 billion industry that employs over 8 thousand Ohio workers.
- The 4th largest maritime state by tonnage moved with 9 ports on Lake Erie and 16 terminals on the Ohio River.
- Within one day's drive of 63 percent of U.S. manufacturing facilities.
- Within one day's drive of 80 percent of U.S. corporate headquarters.
- 60 percent of the U.S. population and 50 percent of the Canadian population are within 600 miles of Ohio.
- The only state in which exports have increased each year since 1998.

Distribution and Logistics
